

At Marshall University, we change lives and inspire extraordinary futures.

Marshall University is one of West Virginia's oldest public institutions of higher education and its second largest. The institution was named after US Supreme Court Justice John Marshall and founded as Marshall Academy in 1837. It was designated Marshall College in 1858 and attained university status in 1961.

Our students attach high value to our small class sizes, having faculty members actively instructing in the classroom, the availability of intensive advising, exceptional student success resources, modern facilities, a growing global community and robust extracurricular programming.

We have more than 13,600 students from 49 states and more than 50 countries. Beyond the classroom, our students participate in 230 recognized student organizations, providing a broad spectrum of extramural opportunities. Our faculty members are leaders, mentors and cultivators of talent. They are making real-life differences for our students, many of whom are the first in their families to attend college.

In addition to Marshall's strong traditional liberal arts and biosciences programs, newly developed programs in digital forensics, pharmacy, physical therapy and public health have created new centers of excellence. The Joan C. Edwards School of Medicine and its relationship with two extremely effective medical centers make Marshall a regional leader in rural health. Our alumni are the heart and soul of the Marshall family. They have gone on to lead Fortune 500 companies, win Pulitzer Prizes and become leaders of industry, science, education and the arts.

Huntington, West Virginia

Huntington is located along the Ohio River in the tri-state region of West Virginia, Ohio and Kentucky. You have the opportunity to explore the beauty that West Virginia has to offer, as well as travel to many of the most popular destinations in the US.

Small Towns, Friendly People, Big Adventures

The residents of West Virginia and Huntington are renowned for their hospitality and how they embrace Marshall students. The university is the center of activity for the region's cultural and sports activities. The annual International Festival in downtown Huntington, sponsored by Marshall, is one of the city's favorite and most colorful special events.

Huntington also has a vibrant downtown shopping, dining and entertainment district, anchored by Marshall's new Visual Arts Center, which is just a short walk from Marshall's main campus. Students who love the outdoors enjoy many kilometers of walking and biking trails, public parks and paths along the Ohio River. The picturesque Ritter Park is a favorite leisure destination for students, while Harris Riverfront Park and Pullman Square are popular spots for outdoor concerts and festivals.

Living in West Virginia

West Virginia offers a relaxed lifestyle, world-class health care, modern schools and friendly, welcoming communities.

Although Huntington is only a few hours' drive from major East Coast cities, West Virginia is still mostly rural with uncrowded roadways and a crime rate 5% below the national average. The cost of living is, on average, lower than the rest of the US.

An Outdoor Recreation Paradise

West Virginia's mountains, forests, rivers and wildlife provide plenty of opportunities for adventure, with dozens of square kilometers of public recreation areas, 37 state parks, more than 1,200 kilometers of hiking trails and 20 million square meters of fishing waters. Marshall is less than two hours from some of America's best whitewater rafting, rock climbing and mountain biking.

Marshall University was named after the fourth Chief Justice of the US Supreme Court, John Marshall. In its 180 years of existence, Marshall has become a leading public university providing innovative undergraduate and graduate education in 200 academic fields of study in 10 colleges. At Marshall, you can choose from 58 undergraduate and 57 graduate programs.

Marshall has an operating budget of \$269 million, generating \$29 million in research funding and \$1.5 billion in economic impact each year.

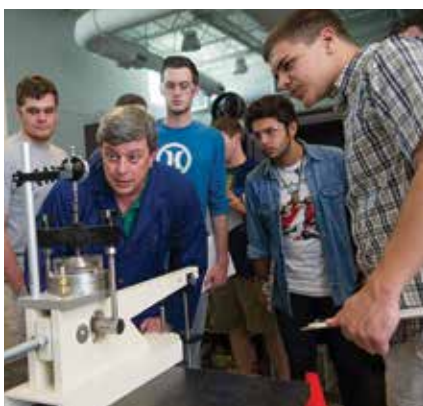

Hands-on Learning at Marshall

Marshall's commitment to preparing students for a career is enforced by student-accessible research and real world application in the classroom.

Undergraduate Research

Marshall University is an institutional member of the Council on Undergraduate Research. You will have opportunities to learn through research beginning from your first degree-related courses at Marshall.

Hands-on Learning

We pride ourselves on allowing students hands-on opportunities to practice in their field during their studies at Marshall. Examples of this include:

- **College of Business simulation classes:** Graduate programs help students gain in-depth understanding of business using real-world problem solving through discussions, cases and interactions with business leaders. Simulations allow students to replicate as closely as possible the challenges of operating a company.
- **School of Journalism and Mass Communications:** The SOJMC at Marshall has many resources where students can

gain real-world experience during class or by joining student organizations such as the university's student newspaper, award-winning radio station or television channel.

- **The Forensic Science Program's Crime Scene House:** A dedicated facility where students can obtain real-world experience and training through the completion of mock crime scene exercises.

State-of-the-art Engineering Facilities

The Arthur Weisberg Family Applied Engineering Complex has expanded the College of Information Technology and Engineering's offerings for hands-on learning opportunities.

- The Advanced Materials Testing Lab has a 20-ton crane, a floor of pre-stressed concrete and other features such as material prep, specimen curing, corrosion lab, data analytics, and more, providing testing resources for students and local businesses.

- The Transportation Lab is used by staff to monitor traffic across West Virginia in cooperation with local government. The lab contains 18 computers using the Trafficware Synchro software for modeling and analyzing traffic signals.
- The MU Visualization (VIS) Lab showcases a state-of-the-art 3D display system providing faculty, researchers, students and local businesses the opportunity to access top-of-the-line visualization equipment.

Individualized Attention

Small class sizes allow instructors to know your name and personally help you. Most classes are taught by professors, so you get to know the faculty in your department. You can also connect with your professors outside of class for additional help by phone, email or by visiting their office.

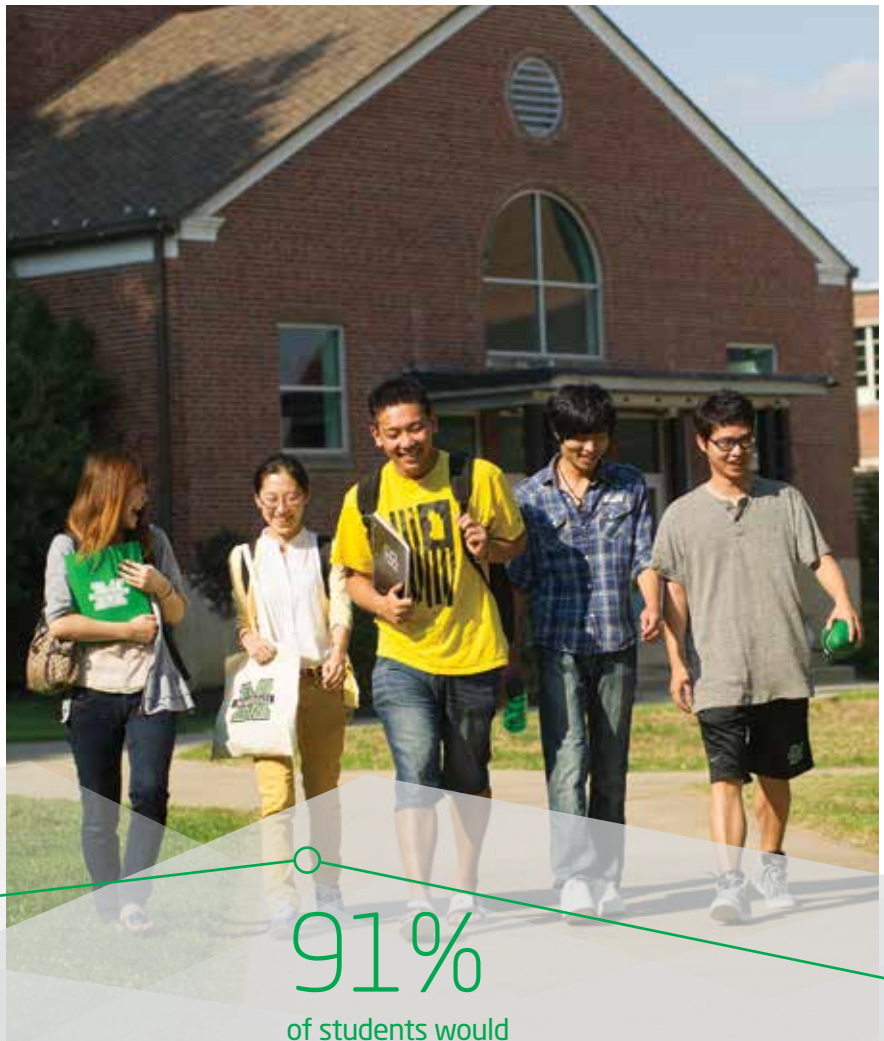

Undergraduate Admissions

Undergraduate students earn a bachelor's degree, which is typically a four-year program, and can choose from more than 58 academic programs to study. Marshall offers three different paths for you to earn your bachelor's degree: direct entry, Pathway programs and English language programs.

Direct Entry

Marshall University offers direct admission to qualified international students who have successfully earned a high school diploma and have strong English language comprehension. If you do not meet these requirements, we encourage you to apply to our Pathway or English Language programs. Full entry requirements are on page 17.

Our International Year One Pathway programs combine intensive language study, academic skills development and academic coursework. Students in the Pathway program will be taking freshman-level courses. Credits earned at other colleges and universities will be evaluated for credit toward a degree program at Marshall after a student completes the program.

Decide if the Program is Right for You

For entry requirements, including English Language levels, view the chart on the right. The Undergraduate Pathway program is typically for students who:

- Want to study for an undergraduate degree in the US
- Desire additional academic, language and cultural support in order to succeed during the first year at a US university
- May need to improve English language skills
- May have a lower GPA than required for direct admission to degree program

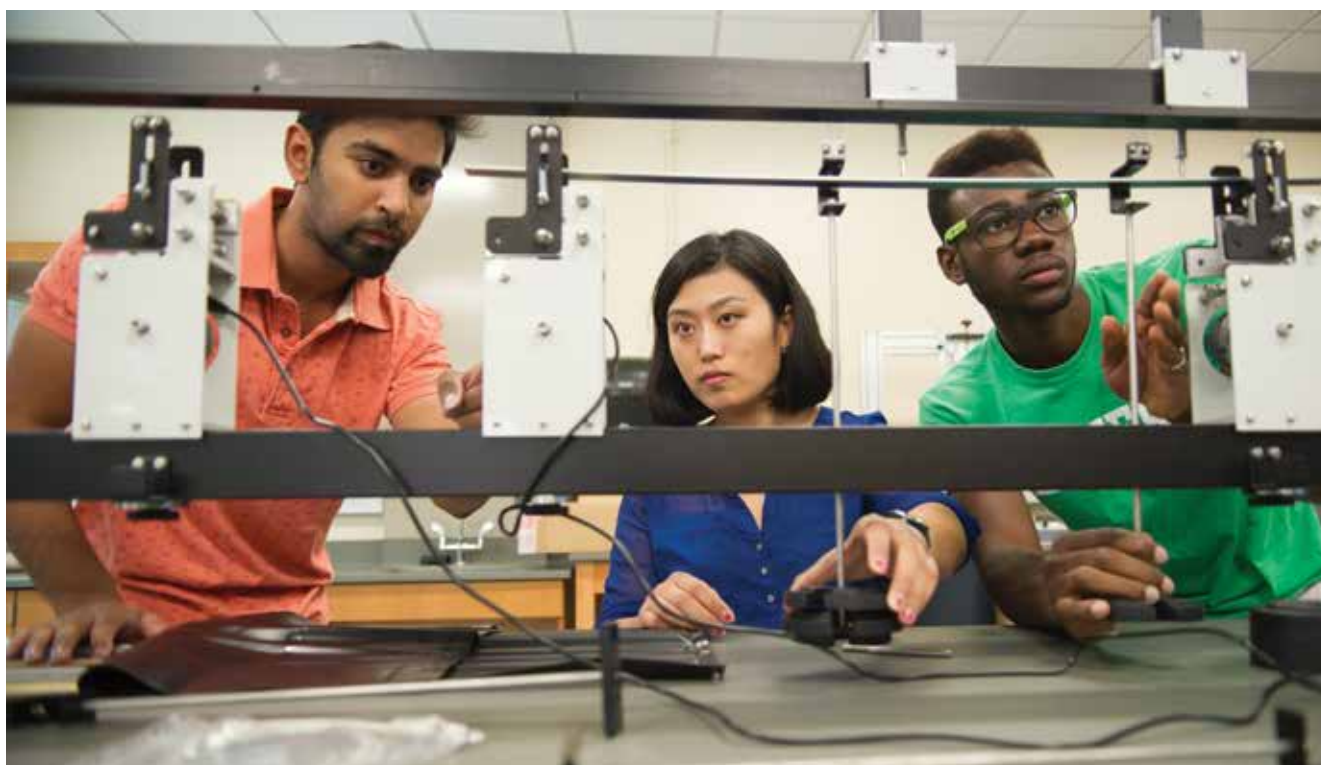

New Graduate Pathway Programs

Master of Science in Health Informatics

The Master of Science in Health Informatics program at Marshall University prepares students with the synthesis of knowledge, skills and values in health information technology that will enable them to enhance the healthcare delivery system, thereby increasing the quality and affordability of healthcare.

This program is one of the first three in the US accredited by The Commission on Accreditation for Health Informatics and Information Management Education, along with being the only accredited graduate-level health informatics program in the state of West Virginia.



Master of Social Work

Marshall's Master of Social Work program is split into two types: Advanced Standing and Generalist. Students who already hold a Bachelor of Social Work enter the Advanced Standing program, while students with a bachelor's degree in another area enter the Generalist program.

The MSW program offers focused social work practical application in integrated behavioral health with specializations focused on underserved populations, military veterans and military families. This includes courses in mental health and substance abuse assessment and intervention; social work practice with families and groups; social policy issues impacting health services delivery and social work practice with military families.

Because of Marshall's location in the West Virginia, Kentucky and Ohio tri-state, more internship opportunities exist than are typically available in rural settings.

Master of Arts in Music

The Master of Arts in Music degree prepares students for careers in performance, education and other music-related fields. Additionally, the department provides enriching experiences for those who will continue their musical activities as an avocation, and to cultivate within the region an increased awareness of the education, cultural and aesthetic aspects of music.

MA in Music students may choose from areas of emphasis in music education, music history and literature, music performance or composition.

Master of Public Administration

The mission of the Master's degree in Public Administration at Marshall is to prepare graduate students to competently lead and manage government and non-profit agencies. The interdisciplinary curriculum strengthens students' understanding of how governments and non-profits work to meet societal needs, emphasizing the values of ethics, transparency and professional service in public administration.

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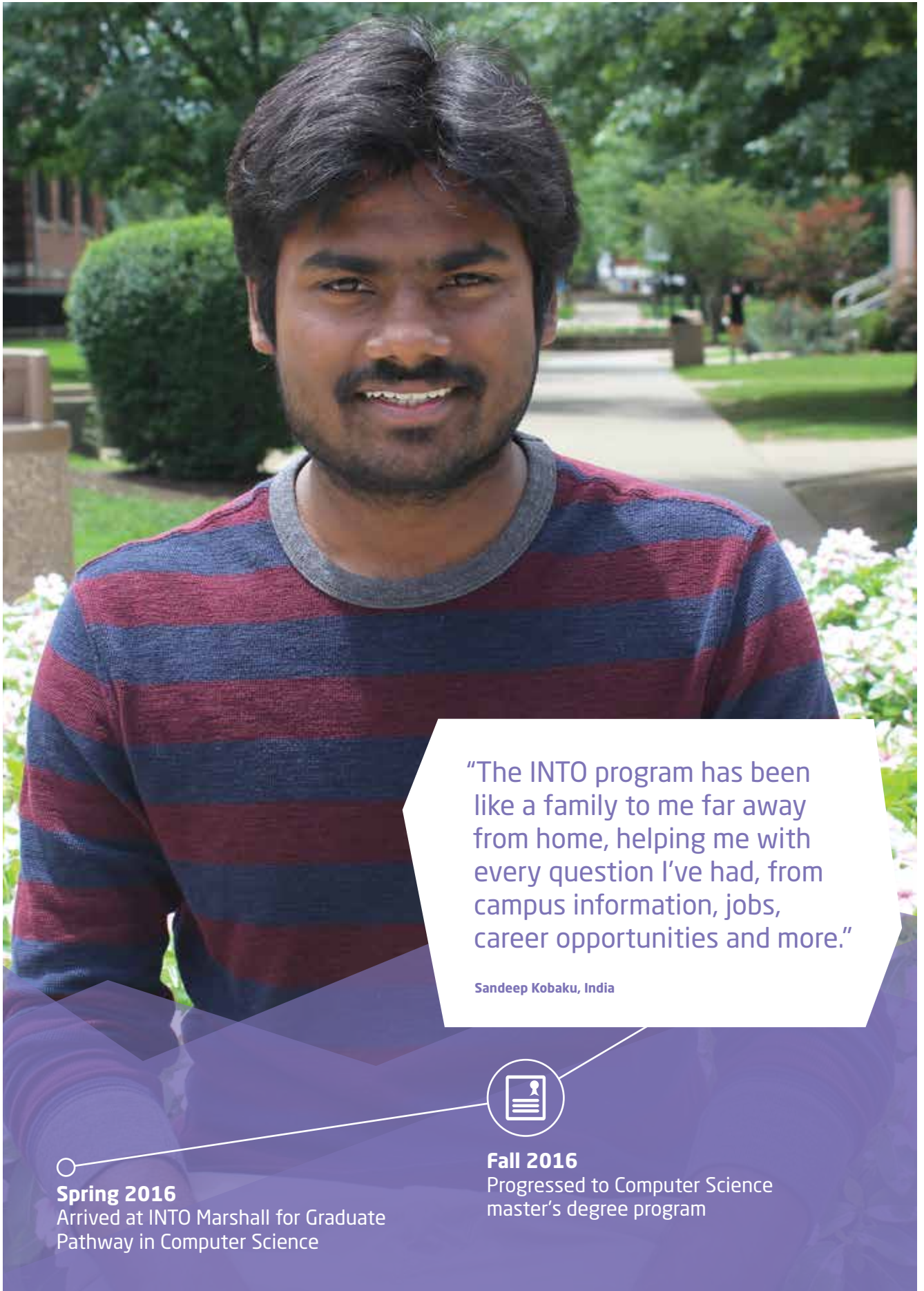

Adventure Recreation Center

The Adventure Recreation Center provides challenging, fun and educational programs that teach outdoor skills, teamwork and self-confidence, encourage personal growth and enable participants to stay fit. The center includes an indoor climbing facility, gear rentals and team building programs. You can rent outdoor recreation equipment for use in the forests, mountains, rivers and parks near campus and across West Virginia.

On-campus Housing

Living on campus is a popular part of the American college experience and a way to help you integrate in to the campus community. Marshall's 10 residence halls are designed to enhance your campus living experience and make Marshall your home away from home. Living on Campus

Undergraduate Pathway and Academic English students are required to live on campus for their first two consecutive years. Graduate Pathway students may live in the residence halls if space is available.

Marshall University requires all freshman and sophomore students enrolled for 12 or more credit hours to reside in the residence halls and participate in a meal plan. This excludes summer sessions and is applicable until the student attains junior academic standing (60 credit hours), reaches age 21, has graduated from high school two or more years prior to the current academic year, or an exemption is granted by the Office of Housing and Residence Life.

To best enhance the student experience, we try to pair INTO Marshall students with American roommates so you can share your cultures with one another while you also gain extra English language practice.

Residence Hall Communities

Living in Marshall's residence halls provides you with a variety of resources and a support structure far beyond the classroom.

Academic Success: Students living on campus typically achieve higher grade point averages than students who live off campus.

Connections: You'll form valuable connections when you participate in your residence hall community. Educational and social activities are hosted with the goal of building connections among you and your peers, the institution and the greater Huntington community.

Diversity: Each residence hall is a diverse, multicultural community of different backgrounds, beliefs and orientations. This gives opportunities for you and your peers to learn from one another in an inclusive and open environment.

Guidance and Support: Residence hall staff is available 24 hours per day to guide you personally and academically.

Leadership: You will find opportunities for involvement such as Hall Council, the Residence Hall Association and Student Security.

Living Green: All residence halls are committed to recycling and other sustainable practices.

Safety and Security

Your safety and security as a Marshall student is a top priority. Exterior building doors of residence halls are monitored by an online electronic access control system 24 hours per day. Each residence hall has a front desk staffed around the clock. Guests must check in with desk staff before entry. Marshall police officers routinely patrol all areas.

Housing at Marshall University is not guaranteed and rooms are assigned on a first-come, first-served basis. Every effort will be made to provide you with your first choice in housing. Applying early will increase the likelihood of placement in your desired location.

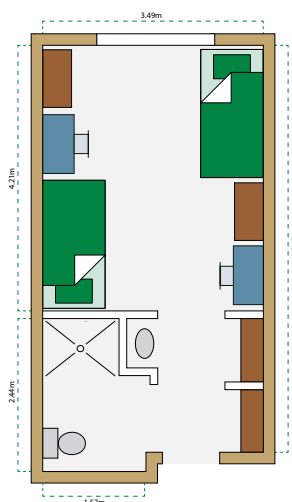
Residence Hall Descriptions

The First-year Residence Halls are designated for freshman students only. These four-story buildings offer double-occupancy rooms where you share a room and a private bathroom with one roommate. Each room has hookups for premium streaming cable television with movie channels and high-speed internet, and is equipped with air conditioning. You have access to a kitchenette to prepare meals or snacks and can visit the study lounges throughout the building to meet friends for a study session. Each building also has a theater room, recreation lounges including pool and table tennis, classrooms and apartments for faculty-in-residence and full-time professional staff.

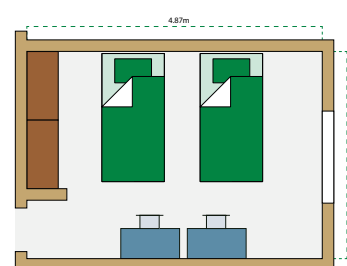
FYRH also houses Living Learning Communities and Theme Housing. Students are required to be under 21 years of age to reside in the First-year Residence Halls and an ID card is required for entry as a safety measure. The front desk is staffed 24 hours per day, so there is always someone available to help.

Twin Towers are two 15-story, co-ed residence halls that offer both single- and double-occupancy rooms, meaning you can live alone or with a roommate. Each room has premium streaming cable television with movie channels and high-speed internet hook-ups. Bathrooms, laundry facilities and a microwave are located on each floor. There is a full kitchen and study lounge/computer lab on the first floor of each building, along with a recreation area offering televisions, a pool table and table tennis. Twin Towers are home to Living Learning Communities and Theme Housing, and are conveniently located on either side of Marshall's newest dining facility, Towers Marketplace, so you can enjoy a meal without even leaving the building. The front desk is staffed 24 hours per day and an ID card is required for entry to the building to ensure your safety.

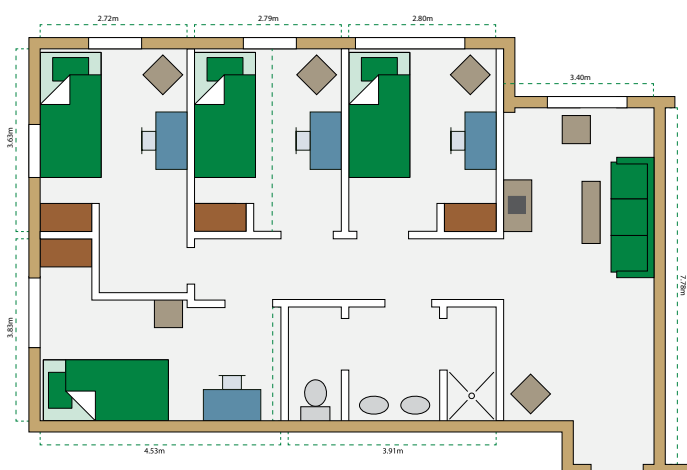

Marshall Commons (Gibson and Wellman Halls) are suite-style, co-ed residence halls that offer a variety of layouts to best suit your needs. Internships and Working

Being a part of the Marshall community is more than attending class and earning a degree. Students have many available resources to find employment both during and after their studies, as well as internships that are required for some degree programs.

Work Opportunities

At Marshall, you have many opportunities to learn beyond the classroom. We want to support you in your career path.

Working while Studying

We understand that many international students would like to work in the US during or after their studies. While this is determined at the discretion of American immigration officers, there are some opportunities to work during and after studies at Marshall and INTO Marshall. Students on an F-1 or J-1 student visa are allowed to work on the Marshall University campus on a part-time basis (20 hours/week or less) while school is in session and full-time (40 hours/week) during breaks, as long as they maintain their F-1/J-1 status. F-1 students may work on campus without any special authorization. J-1 students must get employment authorization in advance from the Center for International Programs. The INTO Marshall provides a valuable link in the university/employer network. There are a limited number of on-campus jobs each semester, employment is not guaranteed.

Career Services

The Office of Career Services helps students combine their passion, strengths and skills into a career that will bring both success and satisfaction. INTO Marshall Student Employment

Positions for employment at INTO Marshall are available, but are limited and competitive. There are two different positions available within the INTO Marshall center.

Student workers are in charge of working at the welcome desk. They answer phones, work directly with other students and help INTO Marshall staff with day-to-day activities such as planning programs, trips and events. Student Workers are paid the US minimum wage and work no more than 20 hours per week.

Student ambassadors are in charge of arrivals, orientations and reaching out to future students. They help incoming students by answering questions and

providing any information needed before the student arrives in West Virginia. Student Ambassador positions are only open to INTO Marshall students who are in Academic English Level 3 or above, or in a Pathway program. They are given a scholarship each semester to help with tuition costs and work three weeks during the summer and during any intake/arrival.

Working after Graduation

Depending on the type of visa, you may be eligible for Optional Practical Training or Academic Training. These opportunities generally provide work authorization for 12 months after graduation from a degree program. STEM students can apply for a 17-month extension.

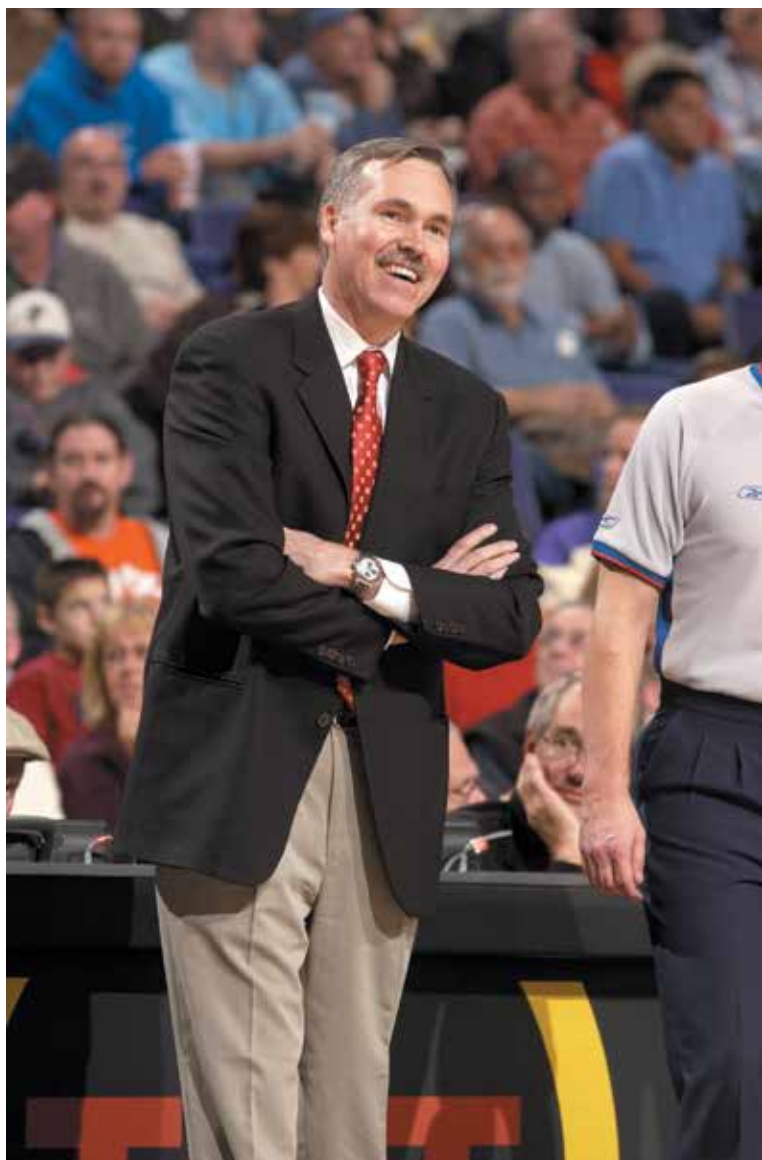
To be eligible for OPT, you must meet the following requirements:

- Be a current student in good academic standing and have maintained F-1 visa status throughout their studies
- Apply for OPT during a vacation period, after finishing a degree or, if they are a graduate student, in the time period between completing all coursework and finishing their thesis or dissertation

Students intending to practice engineering in the US will be required to have their undergraduate transcripts evaluated by the National Council of Examiners for Engineering at their own cost. Visit: www.ncees.org/credentials-evaluations

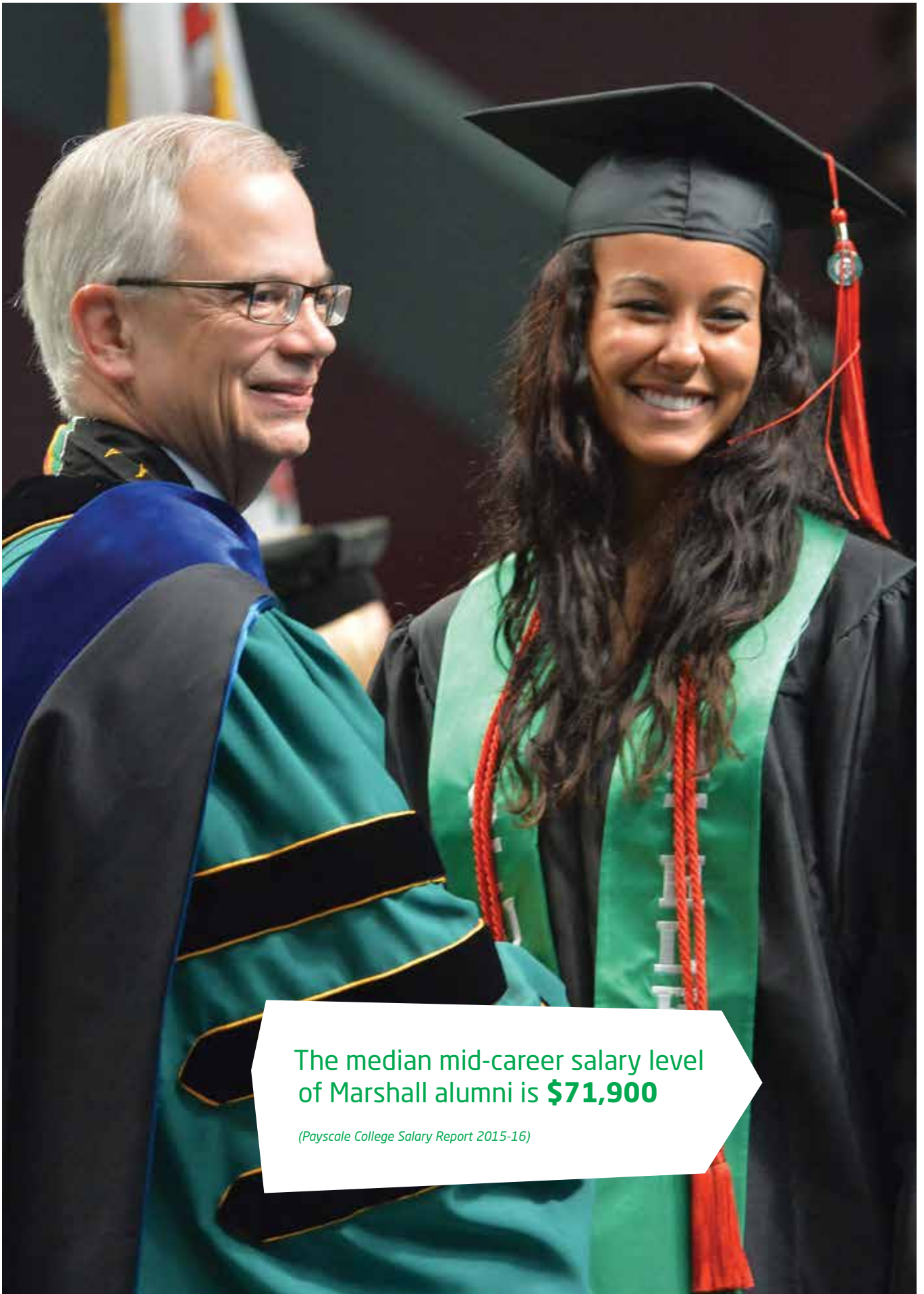
